Criteria	Description
Clear main message/argument	Have a clear message/ proposition/ thesis/ research question that you develop in the text. Check:
	 Do you say clearly what this is in your introduction? Does your argument and structure of the essay support this?
	 Do you recap your argument in the discussion/conclusion?
Clear definition of main concepts	 Do you define the main concepts that the user should know about? Check: Do you define these concepts before first use? Do you avoid overwhelming the user with many concepts that you never use further? Do you consistently use the concepts that you have defined in the rest of the essay?
Balancing sources and your own analysis	An essay should build on some sources and your own analysis of these sources. Sources can be of different types, mainly research-based on non-research based (e.g. news articles). You should have a clear plan for how your essay is built, i.e. mainly based on research, mainly based on your own analysis. Check:
	 Do you clarify the role of your sources versus your own analysis in the essay? Do you refer properly to your sources and provide proper bibliography data? Do you make proper use of research literature versus other types of sources?
Language and flow	You should read several times through your text and try to improve the language and the flow of the text. Check: - Do you explain what you want to say in the essay
	 early on? Do you use marker text to explain and sum up text along the way? Have you considered using tools such as MS grammar check or Grammarly? Have you used the IEEE template for formatting your text?
List of references	All references should be referred using full bibliographic data and in IEEE citation style. Tips: You can use tools such as Zotero to automate citation and create correct formatting automatically.
